Ass'n's. Legal Fund Goes Over the Top

The Strathmore Civic Association's legal fund drive to pay \$3,250 legal costs to bring suit against Levitt and Sons, Inc., for additional recreational land needed by the community went over the top, it was revealed at the March meeting of the Association by Jon White, Fund Drive Coordinator.

White, who headed the canvass conducted on a door-to-door basis on March 20, 21 and 22, announced that \$3,822 had been received.

White said 13 area leaders and 150 canvassers contacted about 80 per cent of the homes in Strathmore. About three-quarters of the homeowners contributed to the drive. White complimented Leslie Hellenack of 9 Icemeadow Lane, Jim Mc Keon of 44 Idolstone Lane, and David Sutliff of 31 Cypress Lane, and Morton Gudel of 25 Ferland Lane, for turning in the highest totals per home.

Other area leaders were: John Driscoll, Northland; Frank Gilbert, Ivy Hill; William Lynch, Ivy Hill; John Mead, Ivy Hill; Irwin Melnicoff, Juniper Park; Ken Schaefer, Oxford; Robert Shapiro, Andover; Ralph Shaw, Deerfield and Pete Vitacco, Andover.

White said the results of the drive prove the legal suit "does have wide community support and enthusiasm."

ELECTIONS FEATURE APRIL MEETING

Elections for the top four posts will be the main feature of the April meeting of the Civic Association General Assembly. According to the By-Laws of the Association, elections for President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer shall be held at the April General Assembly meeting. Township-Borough Merger Studied by Civic Ass'n. Report at April Meeting

A great deal of interest has been expressed in the work of the Civic Association Merger Study Committee as a result of several newspaper articles. The principal objective of the group is to study the advisability and feasibility of a merger or consolidation of the borough and the township. It is not the function of the committee to specifically advocate merger. The group's recommendation will be made to the Civic Association in April.

The present New Jersey State law dealing with mergers has been in effect since 1939. Under this law, a successful merger was consummated between the towns of Vineland and Landis, making this the largest city in New Jersey in total area. A local government bureau in Trenton in a recent report states that "consolidation of municipalities is one of the most discussed subjects at the municipal level." Merger is taking place in other parts of the country such as Los Angeles and Denver.

The Merger Study Committee of the Civic Association is considering many problems which relate to the consolidation of the Township and Borough. Probably the most important area is the adjustment of the tax burden on the citizens of the two communities. In New Jersey, this is particularly difficult because most of the municipal revenues are derived from real estate taxes. However, because the tax rates in the two municipalities are quite close, difficulties in this area are minimized. Furthermore, a large portion of the tax bill in both towns is for school and other county functions, which would remain unchanged after a merger. Also, in the financial field, there are problems that are being studied in connection with debt service, tax collection, borrowing capacity and the relative values of contributed assets.

In many of the basic municipal services, it is expected that economies can be realized over the next several years through consolidation of activities. The elimination of duplicate equipment in certain services such as street cleaning and repair would result in a reduction of costs.

One of the most intriguing aspects of the merger is in the practical phase of planning for the future growth of the community. Because of the proximity of the two municipalities plans in order to be effective should be applied to the entire area, rather than to separate segments.

The committee realizes the political implications of combining communities and a merger plan to be successful must work out these problems. Locally, the committee has spoken to representatives

What's Going on in Regional School System?

Plenty — and are we relieved! Yes, on June 2, the referendum for the much needed new schools in the Matawan Regional School System will be presented for public approval.

If the referendum passes, prompt preparations will be made for construction of two new schools. They are part of the 10-year program recently unveiled by the Board of Education, which has been broken down into three phases. The June referendum will concern only Phase One, and includes the following:

Trace Elements Are Vital to Plants

Trace elements are fast disappearing from many soils due to the decrease of organic matter in the top soil. When soils become deficient in trace elements, hunger signs appear. If MANGANESE is deficient, the leaves of plants become pale green, yellow or red and finally white. The veins stay green. IRON hunger is indicated by yellowing of the younger leaves and resulting poor growth of the plant.

A lack of sufficient COPPER causes young leaves to wilt.

Plant hunger for ZINC makes grayish brown to bronze-colored spots appear on leaves and causes rosette formation at the top of the plant.

BORON deficiency retards the development of lateral buds and causes buds and tips to die. Flowers often fail to open. MOLYBDENUM starvation is demonstrated by mottling of older leaves which eventually curl inward and die along tips and margins.

Deed Restrictions to Be Noted

1. (a) No lot shall be used except for residential purposes. A lot may contain only one detached single-family dwelling not to exceed 2-1/2 stories and a garage or carport for not more than 3 cars. Only a private passenger vehicle may be garaged. No boat may be stored outdoors. No detached garage or carport or accessory building may be erected.

(b) An attached addition to the dwelling may be erected, but shall not project beyond the front wall of the dwelling or structure as originally erected by Levitt. It must conform in architecture, material and color to the original dwelling.

(c) Private swimming pools may be constructed or erected in the rear yard only. No portion of the pool including its fence shall be closer to the rear or side lot line than the minimum distance required by local ordinance for a principal building on such lot.

(d) A fabricated fence may be erected only in the rear yard in the area as prescribed above. The fence may not exceed 3 feet in height except if prescribed by local ordinance for a fence around a swimming pool. No collapsible, folding or wire fences will be permitted.

(e) The dwelling may be used as a professional office for a Physician, Dentist, Chiropractor, Chiroprapist, Optometrist, Attorney, Accountant, Architect or Engineer. No business or trade of any kind or noxious or offensive activity shall be carried on within or without the dwelling, nor shall anything be done which may become a nuisance to the neighborhood. No trailer, shack or any such structure shall be located, erected or used on any lot.

(f) A radio or television antenna may be attached to a dwelling provided it (1) does not project more than 10 feet above the roof of the dwelling as originally erected, and (2) is connected to the roof only by a single tubular support.

ALTERATION and ADDITIONS

2. No alterations or additions may be made unless it complies with paragraph 1 (b) or unless appropriate plans, specifications and/or colors are approved by Levitt.

COST and SIZE OF DWELLING

3. No dwelling shall be erected on any lot at a cost less than \$11,000 based on cost levels prevailing on date of declaration. The ground floor area of the main structure, exclusive of one story open porches, garages and carports shall be not less than 1,200 square feet for a one-story dwelling nor less than 800 square feet for a dwelling of more than one story.

DRILLING and MINING

4. No drilling or mining operations shall be permitted upon or in any lot.

ANIMALS

5. Not more than (2) dogs, cats or other domesticated household pets may be kept in any house and only if they are not kept, bred or maintained for any commercial purpose.

GARBAGE and RUBBISH

6. Garbage or rubbish shall not be

dumped or allowed to remain on any lot. If contained in a closed metal receptacle, it may be placed outside of the dwelling for collection, in accordance with regulations of the collecting agency.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

7. No cesspool, septic tank or other individual or privately owned sewage disposal system shall be installed or permitted on any lot.

WATER SUPPLY

8. No water well or other individual or privately owned water supply system shall be installed or permitted on any lot.

FENCES

9. Fabricated fences are prohibited on any part of the lot except as set out in paragraph 1 (d). Shrub fences may be planted not to exceed 3 feet in height, except as provided in paragraph 12.

LAUNDRY LINES

10. Only one portable laundry dryer not more than 7 feet high may be used in the rear of each house on days other than Sundays or legal holidays, which shall be removed from the outside when not in actual use.

LAWN MOWING

11. Lawns shall be mowed and weeds removed at least once a week between April 15 and November 15 of each year.

PROTECTIVE SCREENING

12. Plant screening areas provided by Levitt 10 feet back from the intersection of two street lines, or wherever Levitt has provided plan screening material, the owner shall maintain such material intact and shall not remove any part thereof or add to the same. If any such planting dies or is destroyed the owner shall replace the same with planting of the same kind and size.

EASEMENTS

13. (a) No building or structure shall be erected, nor any paving laid nor any filling or excavation done within the easements occupied by such facilities as sewer, water, drainage, electric, gas and telephone.

(b) Levitt and its successors shall at all times have a right of way for the purpose of installing, constructing, reconstructing, maintaining, repairing, operating and inspecting any facility within the easement and shall have a right of way in general in and over each lot for access to easement areas and for installing, operating, etc., any meters appurtenant to such facilities.

VIOLATIONS

14. Violations remedied by Levitt shall be at the expense of the lot owner and shall be payable on demand.

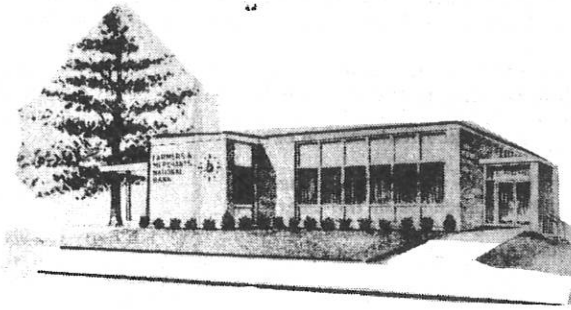
ENFORCEMENT

15. Enforcement shall be by proceeding at law or in equity, brought by Levitt, its successors, or by the owner of any lot, against any person violating any covenant or restriction, either to restrain violation or to recover damages or both.

SEVERABILITY

16. Invalidation of any of the covenants and restrictions by judgement or court order shall in no way affect full force and effect.

Of the two schools to be built in Phase One, South K-8 will be located in the immediate Strathmore area, (adjacent to Lloyd Road), and North K-6 will be located in the Borough.

The K-8 (kindergarten through eighth grade) building will be designed to allow maximum flexibility. While serving initially as an Elementary School offering an enriched educational program, it will also be readily adaptable to a Junior High School program if necessary, in the future.

Of particular note in the proposed new K-8 school is the auditorium seating 450 (with a built in stage), a cafeteria with a capacity of 450, a dental suite, 2 kindergarten rooms, 22 standard classrooms, 1 language room, 2 science rooms (plus 2 for future use), a fine arts room, a health suite, a gymnasium with separate locker facilities, a general shop and a library with an office and storage space. Total student capacity will be slightly over 900 students.

EXCITING NEWS?

We think so, and the Education Committee is proud that our efforts have played a part in this building program.

Oh yes, one other thing — YOU must do YOUR part too, in order to make this plan become a reality. VOTE YES in the special referendum on **June 2**. Register now if you missed the last election. 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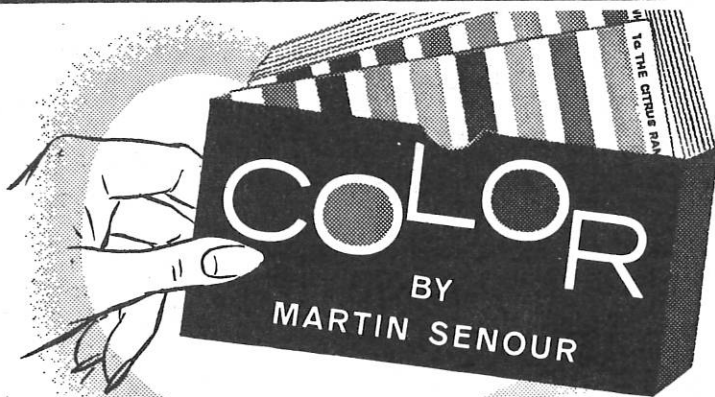
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**Cross of Glory

Rev. Richard A. Weeden, temporary pastor of the Cross Of Glory Lutheran Church, Matawan, announced that the church is negotiating for a site on Route 79 and Orchard Parkway in Marlboro Township. If the necessary variance is granted, the building program calls for a fund drive to get under way this fall, ground breaking in the Summer of 1965, and completion of a church building in 1966.

Since it began holding services in the Strathmore Elementary School last Sept. 8, church membership has grown from 81 adults to 150 adults and 87 children. The Sunday School now has 70 students and a staff of ten. A two week vacation church school is planned for this summer.

Mr. Palla is church treasurer and Mrs. Norbert Dohn, secretary.

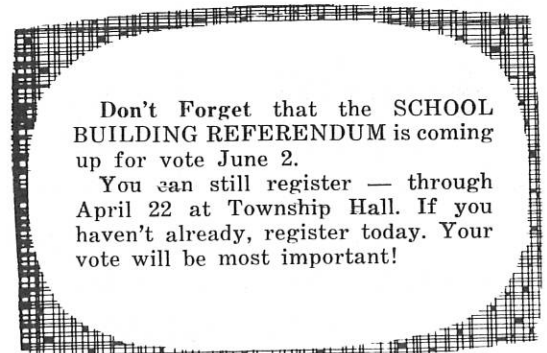
Mrs. Thomas Magee will be in charge of the vacation school.
